
New Hampshire Orchid Society General Meeting Minutes May 13, 2023

Members Auction – August 12, 2023

- This years member's auction will coincide with the Annual Meeting at the Bedford Town Hall on Saturday, August 12, 2023. All members in good standing are allowed to have their plants auctioned off.
- Each member is allowed to enter 10 plants into the auction, and the split will be 80% to you and 20% to NHOS of the final auction price received.
- This year you may put as many as 20 plants onto your list prioritized in the order that you wish to have them sold. The first 10 on each list will be accepted first and if it is decided more plants are needed then the next plant on your list will be added in a fair and equitable manner amongst all the entries.
- Lists need to be to me, Susan Usseglio @ (Susan@nhorchids.org) by 7/1/2023, if you have any pictures of the plants you are going to auction, please send them along. The software program that we use allows for an on-line catalogue for your viewing pleasure and a link will be posted on the website that will get you to this catalogue. Included in the catalogue will be the plants that are up for auction, their name, photograph of the flower, hybrid or species and growing conditions (cool, intermediate, warm).
- The auction will be run by NHOS under the supervision of the Auction Committee and will utilize the standard established rules used for the Annual fund-raising Auction. Members Auction guidelines and Auction rules will be included in the next three newsletters.
- Plants need to groomed, free of insects and signs of disease. Affected plants will be removed from the table. Orchids should be staked if necessary and potted in the appropriate container (i.e., if the orchid sends out inflorences from the bottom of the plant the contain must support this growth habit (baskets, net pots). Name tags are to be legible and in good shape.
- On the day of the auction there will be a listing for each person participating in the auction that will have your plants, the numbers assigned to them a sheet of yellow dots with the number of the plant indicated on them. These yellow dots are to be affixed to the tag of the plants designated on the list.
- There will also be a listing of persons in the society with all your contact information and bidding number assigned, there are sheets that have the numbers 1-100; please take your assigned number. Please check the sheet for your name and number remembering to validate your information. If you have not be included on this list, put your name at the end include your contact information and take your number.
- NHOS accepts all forms of payment, cash, checks and charge.
- If you have any questions, please let me know.

Auction Rules

- Auction is open to ALL.
- All those intending to bid must register and be assigned a bidder's number prior to bidding.
- Bidding numbers will be assigned in sequential order (no special numbers).
- Bids may only be advanced by minimum of \$1.00 increments (no increases of \$0.50 or \$0.25).
- Payment for items bid upon is expected on the day of the auction by cash, check or charge.
- Bidders accept the responsibility to make themselves seen and/or heard in placing their bid (feel free to yell out the meek may inherit the earth but they might miss out on the good plants).
- Winning bidders are required to show their bidder number for the auctioneer to confirm their Bidder' ID Number and winning bid.
- Auctioneers will make every attempt to notice each and every bid however, the auctioneers' decisions on which bid occurred first shall be final.
- Bidding may continue until the auctioneer proclaims "Sold". Any bids occurring after this are void. The auctioneers' decisions are final in these matters.
- If you place a bid on a single item being auctioned, you are expected to honor it (no retractions).
- In the case of 'multiple auctions' where two or more of the same items are being auctioned simultaneously, retractions may be permitted if the second highest (or subsequent) bidder feels that the item he or she has won is not worth the price bid and the item will be offered to the next highest bidder at their bid. (In these auctions, high bidder gets pick, then next highest, and so on. If the items vary significantly in size and/or quality, the second highest bidder may not feel that the item offered them is worth what they bid).
- Upon conclusion of bidding on an item, the auctioneer will call out the winning bid and the winning bidder's ID number. At this time, it is the bidder's responsibility to ensure that information called out by the auctioneer is accurate (correct bid price, correct ID number, etc.).
- The auctioneers may exercise their judgement to withdraw a plant or merchandise from bidding if the auctioneer feels that the final bid is considerably below the item's value. Items withdrawn will be used for future auction, raffle or another fundraiser. The auctioneers' decisions in these cases are final.



Members' and Vendors' Auction Guidelines

- There shall be one scheduled opportunity and a Special Auction for current members to auction plants under the aegis of the Auction Committee:
 - a) An Annual Members' and Vendors' Auction and
 - b) A Special Auction granted under extraordinary circumstances.
- The Annual Members' and Vendors' Auction shall be available to all members. The timing of this auction for this year will be August at the annual meeting. In October of this year, we will be having a Special Auction of plants from Bob Cleveland. The guidelines include:
 - a) Each member (or "family", if a family member) shall be allowed to auction up to 10 plants. Out of those 10, three (3) may have a reserve set on them.
 - b) The auction will be run by NHOS under the supervision of the Auction Committee and will include publicity, clerking, actual auctioning of plants, collection of funds, etc. The auction shall be run under the standard, established rules used for the Annual Fund-raising Auction. The seller shall have the option of auctioning his or her own plants.
 - c) The split of proceeds shall be 80% seller, 20% NHOS.
 - d) The auction shall be held at a meeting without an invited, formal speaker (although a back-up program might be scheduled in the event that the auction has few plants).
- Special auctions shall be held under extraordinary circumstances such as the grower's death or health issues etc. or other catastrophic conditions. Growers over purchasing or moving their plants out for the summer and not being able to fit them back into their growing area does not constitute "catastrophic conditions". A presentation by the party requesting the auction (or their agent) shall be made to the NHOS Board of Directors along with the chairperson of the Auction Committee. If granted by a vote of the Board of Directors, the Auction committee will propose a date that will not impact planned activities.

Special auctions shall:

- a) Be held as soon as possible in coordination with the Programs Committee Chair
- b) Shall be run by NHOS and the Auction Committee as outlined above, and
- c) The split of proceeds shall be 80% seller, 20% NHOS.
- d) For 2023 this auction will take place at the October Meeting and will showcase plants from Bob Cleveland.
- The Auction Committee recognizes that other exceptional situations may arise where an auction could be considered. In these cases, a presentation by the party requesting the auction (or their agent) shall be made to the NHOS Board of Directors. The chairperson of the Auction Committee shall also be in attendance to present the pros and cons of the proposal, including what impact it might have upon the society and its planned activities. The Board shall then decide by vote as to whether to proceed with the auction and how it will be run. The proceeds split will be 80% seller and 20% NHOS, the usual proceeds split.

By the Editor

When I was assembling this months edition of the NHOS newsletter, I found it interesting that two members of the Society brought the same plant to the May show table. It's actually not an unusual happening given orchids penchant to have a specific blooming season but moreso that it was a plant that I was completely unfamiliar with. Not only was it unfamiliar to me as a species, but I'm not sure I've ever been introduced to any member of that particular genus before, and I've been at this crazy hobby for awhile. As I was doing some research to educate myself on Pholidoata and chinensis in particular, it occurred to me that it might be a good idea to share what I found. Maybe someone else is as curious about it as I was.

The interesting variety of orchids that are successfully grown by our NHOS members never ceases to amaze me. Cold to hot, deep shade to full sun, dry to wet, it seems that it's possible to grow anything here in New Hampshire. And it is if you dedicate enough time (and probably money) to educate yourself and equip your growspace accordingly. The fact that we are so fortunate to have so many phenominal and knowledgeable growers in our society is a benefit that is worth far more than our annual membership dues. So don't be bashful. Get to know all the members of our Society. Ask questions, maybe ask to visit their collection and grow space, and challenge yourself to not be afraid to try something different.

To that point, I'll repeat here a story I love to tell newcomers to the orchid "habit". Several years ago at our annual picnic I was exploring the magnificent greenhouse of NHOS member Bob Richter when I noticed tucked in the corner on his desk were 2 large 2 pound coffee cans stuffed full with old plant tags. When I asked Bob what they were for he responded "Oh, that's my encyclopedia of orchid knowledge. If you haven't killed any, you haven't learned a thing." And he's absolutely right. You can't be afraid to fail!

The following information on Pholidota chinensis is re-printed from my good friend Jay Pfahl's website, the International Orchid Species Photo Encyclopedia (IOSPE) which can be found at http://www.orchidspecies.com/indexpl-pz.htm.

Pholidota Lindley ex Hooker 1825 SUBFAMILY Epidendroideae,

TRIBE Podochileae, SUBTRIBE Coelogyninae.

A mid-sized lithophytic or epiphitic orchid with a creeping or pendant rhizome makes up the 41 species of this genus that are spread from India to South China, Malaysia, Indonesia, New Guinea as well as the Pacific Islands and south to Australia. They are commonly refered to as rattlesnake-tail orchids. The genus has close to distant, slender to swollen pseudobulbs carrying 1 to 2, narrowly elliptic, ovate to oblong, petiolate, coriaceous to herbaceous leaves blooming on a terminal, slender, racemose, distichous, pendant, laxly to densely many flowered inflorescence with large, concave floral bracts and carries small, fleshy, resupinate to non-resupinate flowers with a concave to convex, broadly ovate to elliptic dorsal sepal with concave to convex, ovate to ovate-oblong, often keeled lateral sepals and ovate to linear petals. They have a sessile, basally saccate epichile, sub-entire to 3 to 4 lobed, deflexed lip with a short, apically hooded column with 4, subglobose to clavate pollina that are free or cohering in pairs by a viscus. Synonyms Acanthoglossum Blume 1825; Camelostalix Pfitzer ex Kraenzl. 1907; Chelonanthera Bl. 1825; Crinonia Bl. 1825; 'Ptilocnema D. Don 1825

Common Name The Chinese Pholidota - In China Shi Xian Tao

Flower Size 3/4" [2 cm]

Found in Vietnam, Myanmar, Hong Kong and Fujian, Guangdong, Guangxi, Hiuzhou, Hainan, Xizang, Yunnan and Zheziang provinces of China growing on damp rocks near streams in shady as well as open areas or as an epiphyte on rain forest trees in evergreen lowland forests or primary montane forests at elevations of 300 to 2500 meters as a small sized, cool to cold growing lithophyte and epiphyte that is with ovoid, sulcate pseudobulbs carrying 3, ovate-oblong to linear-lanceolate leaves that blooms in the spring on a 6" to 12" [15 to 30 cm] long, pendulous inflorescence that arises from the apex of a new growth before or as it develops the new leaves, with many [35], fragrant flowers.

Our speaker will be Tim Culbertson who will be talking about modern Sarcochilus hybrids, showcasing these absolute gems of plants with their colorful flowers and miniature size. Tim plans to bring a great selection of orchids for sale during the meeting.

Tim began growing orchids as an offshoot from working at Longwood Gardens in Philadelphia just after college. From the very beginning it was all about Paphs, particularly awarded and select clones of historic importance, of which his collection numbers nearly 3000. He loves finding old, rare stepping stones in paph breeding and also does some hybridizing of his own.

Tim is an accredited judge with the American Orchid Society, and has served in various capacities with various orchid societies in California and on the East Coast. In addition to Longwood, he worked at the Smithsonian Institution tending to their orchids, and for years for the United States National Arboretum, collecting rare plants and documenting cultivated species and hybrids for their herbarium.
